

HOW CYCLE EDUCATION CHANGED A TITAN'S LIFE

Emily Hirschfeld is a junior at Trinity High School, active in Titans for Life and Dickinson Youth Commission, who suffers from extreme discomfort with her menstrual period.

"Sometimes I would wake up and just cry," says Hirschfeld. She started to miss school, experiencing nausea, vomiting, and decreased appetite when the pain reached its highest levels.

Her mom was concerned about the severity of her daughter's symptoms, so she reached out to told by others, "Just put Emily on birth control!'

Emily met with Morgan, RN, for a Cycle Education appointment.

"I was nervous at first," says Emily. "There can be a stigma, my peers jumping to the conclusion someone is probably

pregnant if they are being seen at Connect."

Her charts indicated a hormonal imbalance, so she followed up with Dr. Samantha Kiedrowski, who is trained in cycle health. In the end, a common and well-tolerated antinausea/vomiting medication when Emily's chart indicated that her level of progesterone was rising was all she needed.

The standard of care is hormonal contraception for the intensity of her symptoms. That course of treatment was not only against Emily's moral beliefs, it was unnecessary.

"I want other girls my age with period problems to know there

is help. Connect is not a place you will be judged; those nurses will see you as a whole person and help you in any way they can."

Cycle Education is safe, free of cost, and empowers young women to make informed decisions about their health. Knowing how their body works in its natural state helps them to identify when things are not "normal" for them, to appreciate their body, and realize their dignity.

Teaching women to self-advocate lets them know that we believe that they are capable and worthy of making decisions that are aligned with their own deeply held beliefs and optimal for their health outcomes. WHAT'S AWESOME Our speaker, Beth Chase, is considered an expert on the Pregnancy Medical Movement. When radical proabortion groups sued several pregnancy resource centers in Southern California for providing free pregnancy tests and not being medical clinics, she led the way by using their own argument against them.

"Ok," she said. "We'll be medical clinics then."

Beth has helped innumerable navigate waves of intimidation and forge walls of protection around the mission to serve those most vulnerable for an unplanned







pregnancy. She and her husband Craig were here in Dickinson in 2017 and helped our transition to a medical clinic and expand our medical services, like STI testing and fertility awareness education.

She comes to share with us a look back at the last 50 years in our movement, where we are today, and where it's going in the future.

The banquet is our largest fundraising effort of the year, with a goal of raising at least \$100,000 in one-time gifts and increasing our monthly gifts by \$10,000/year.

TIME TO GROW

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Katie Vidmar takes over the Executive Director role, leading the transition to expand sexual health services to serve more patients, including men. Craig and Beth Chase on-site to consult and assist. Staffing the clinic with paid nurses, the numbers continue to climb, serving over 100 women in those two years.

TRUSTED RESOURCE

Connect weathers the pandemic, pivoting educational service online and increasing social media engagement. Vidmar steps down at the end of 2020, and staff nurse Tara Zettel steps into the role. A Nurse Practitioner joins the team in December 2021. Demand for appointments rises exponentially and 482 unique individuals were helped in the clinic.

With the desire to better serve Generation Z, two nurses are trained as Sexual Risk Avoidance Specialists and bring educational outreach into local schools. Fertility Awareness (re: Cycle Health Education) helps women, from puberty to menopause. Over 200 were served, 63 of whom were male.
